







Jobs (filled posts) trend





Since March 2021, the number of jobs has fallen, likely due to the opening back up of the wider economy and the impact of the mandatory vaccination policy.

Change in jobs since March 2021




Between 2019/20 and 2020/21 the number of adult social care jobs increased by 45,000. The majority was jobs in domicilary care services (up 40,000, 7%)




Staff vacancy rates decreased during the pandemic in 2020/21. Since March 2021, the vacancy rate has increased and is now back above pre-pandemic levels.

This suggests the fall in jobs is related to recruitment and retention difficulties rather than a decrease in demand.

Staff turnover rates decreased during the pandemic, however recent evidence suggests employers are struggling with retention now as the wider economy is opened back up.

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




